As a young woman, Margaret craved her independence and left home to join the Navy, and was stationed in Halifax. Margaret met her sweetheart, also in the military, and both decided to wait until after the war before getting married and starting their family on none other than Valour Road.

Margaret had two children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, of whom she was extremely proud. Margaret's work life included time in the bakery at Safeway and helping with the family restaurant business.

When she first arrived at Jocelyn House, Margaret was content to spend much of the time in her room. Her favourite past-times were reading the

paper, watching the birds at the feeder outside her window and frequent visits with her family. As the weeks passed and Margaret gained some strength and energy, she would venture more to the living room to socialize with other residents. She was an avid sports fan and liked to watch curling and hockey with her son, Doug, daughter-in-law, Lori and her Jocelyn House friend, Joyce. Margaret was a curious and attentive woman who loved to hear and tell stories with staff, friends and family, and often while holding their hands.

Likely from her days on the farm, Margaret was a "meat and potatoes girl" who was reluctant at first, but eventually agreed to try and then enjoy new foods prepared by volunteers. One of her best meals was when volunteer Shelley made her favourite... waffles for dinner!

Margaret was a gardener and nature lover. She enjoyed being outdoors to watch the wildlife and oversee the flowers and vegetable gardens.

Her senses of adventure and humour took her outside to the deck, where she recaptured some of her lost youth, and delighted in blowing bubbles.

This gentle, lovely woman and gardener truly "blossomed" and lived life happily during her final days at Jocelyn House, with grace, dignity and strength. As she often said, "I have nothing to complain about, really and truly."

MY INVOLVEMENT WITH PALLIATIVE CARE BEGAN 10 years ago in Neepawa, Man. Under the guidance of an amazing program coordinator, I learned the value of end of life care. I first heard about Jocelyn House in a speech made by JHH volunteer, Shirley Sutherland, when she received an award at a Palliative Care Conference. When I moved to Winnipeg a few years later, I knew I wanted to continue volunteering in hospice care and remembered Shirley's uplifting speech about life at Jocelyn House. I began volunteering at Jocelyn House in October 2010 and that decision has proven to be one of the best I have made.

My volunteer role is to prepare and serve supper. I feel so lucky to share this part of the day with the residents. The stories shared around the supper table are a delight to listen to and there is a lot of laughter! My hope is the simple task of preparing a meal, then sitting down together, provides a bit of normalcy and lightness in the residents' day.

A favorite memory of mine was made one night when the table conversation turned to travel - specifically train travel. As I raved about the fabulous meals served on a VIA Rail trip I had taken a few years earlier, Jim, a new resident, listened with eyes sparkling and grinning from ear to ear. To my surprise, Jim said he had been a chef on VIA and had likely prepared the amazing food I had enjoyed!

A quote by Albert Camus expresses my feelings about what we do at Jocelyn House:

Don't walk behind me; I may not lead. Don't walk in front of me; I may not follow. Just walk beside me and be my friend.
