Our Friend Jane

THE IMPORTANCE OF A GOOD FRIEND in final days and hours has been well documented and Jocelyn House (JHH) is known by many as a place where new and special friendships can flourish. For a resident named Jane, friendships with staff and volunteers helped to make the house at 177 Egerton Road her home.

Jane took up residence at Jocelyn House in December 2014. At seventy-four years of age and living with cancer, she walked through the front door not at all certain about what to expect. But she brought with her a well-honed sense of humour and a lifetime worth of stories and over the days, weeks and months that followed, she also brought smiles and laughter to many who came to know her.

Sr. Jo-Ann, Manager, Spiritual Care & Volunteer Services, remembers Jane as someone who enjoyed being surrounded by people and being part of the conversations and activities going on around her. She was engaging and could be counted on to share a story, whether from her favourite armchair in the living room, at the dinner table, or out on the porch in the summertime. She loved to be entertained whether with music, a good story, a movie (The Sound of Music was her favourite) or a TV show.

Jane also loved to talk about her family and was filled with joy when they would visit from near and far. Family pictures could be found on the walls and tabletops in her bedroom. A visit from any one of her children or grandchildren was special to her.

Looking her best was important and Jane looked forward to having her hair freshly washed and set. Jackie, a JHH Health Care Aide, would often make her day a little more special by giving her a manicure and a pedicure.

Diane, a JHH volunteer, recalls getting to know Jane "over an episode of The Price is Right. When Jane invited me into her room to watch that program with her, I knew we were going to be friends – and we were." Diane spent many a Thursday morning enjoying Jane's company and listening to her reminisce about family and her childhood in rural Manitoba. "Even today, when I walk through the front door at Jocelyn House, I think of Jane and remember that wonderful giggle. We shared important moments during our visits and it was not unusual for us to laugh or shed a tear together."

Jane passed away in September 2015. "I am grateful to have met Jane," says Diane, "and to have had the opportunity to be part of her life for even a brief time. She became a friend."


Master Roofing who provided a premium Jets ticket package during an impromptu auction during the event.

WHAT BROUGHT YOU TO JOCELYN HOUSE?

I previously worked as Agency LPN Nurse and had done several shifts at Jocelyn House as a replacement nurse. It took several years before I actually got a permanent position, when the staffing model changed in 2013 to add LPNs as well as Health Care Aides.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE MOST ABOUT WORKING AT JHH?

I see it as a different kind of nursing and we all work side by side to provide the best kind of care to our residents and their families. In addition to nursing duties, we share the daily tasks such as laundry, cooking and cleaning. It's like being at home, but with your extended family.

HOW DO YOU ADD LIFE TO THE FINAL DAYS FOR RESIDENTS **AND THEIR FAMILIES?**

It starts with the first hello, welcoming the residents and their families during a time of big change for them. Sometimes it's the little things that mean most like just letting families know that we are there when they need an answer to a question, or someone to listen to their concerns, hand them a tissue or just give them a hug. Throughout the last 3 years of nursing at JHH, I have met a lot of special residents and amazing families that have been able to courageously share their loved ones' last days with peace and dignity.

WHAT IS LIFE LIKE FOR YOU OUTSIDE OF JOCELYN HOUSE?

My soulmate and I are parents to 4 children, 3 daughters and a son. I have a granddaughter, Leia and a grandson named Jackson. Things are about to get more exciting this summer as we are adding 2 new grandbabies to the family and only a month apart. I enjoy winter and summer fishing, reading, spending time with the grandkids and the family. I like to decorate for special occasions and some of my talents include quilting, painting, designing furniture, making mukluks, interior design and flower arrangements. Friends and family often wonder where I find the time and energy, and sometimes I wonder too. Nursing is my calling in life and was a request my father made to me before he passed away from cancer 11 years ago.

"When I see the relief in the faces of family members and friends who come to visit, it almost brings tears to my eyes." **I FIRST CAME TO JOCELYN HOUSE** in August of 2013, when my good friend Alison moved in. She had suffered a recurrence of cancer, and sadly, a cure was not to be. The time came when she could no longer manage life at home, and by some miracle, a bed became available at Jocelyn House.

The staff and volunteers at JH cared for her as they would a member of their own family. Having compassionate, competent, and loving people around her at all times removed the fear and loneliness of being on her own. There was always a shoulder and a cup of tea, even in the darkest hours. Her every need was taken care of, whether it was physical, emotional, or spiritual.

When the end came, I was so grateful for the care and support that she had received that I decided that I would like to give back to this wonderful organization. Not gifted in the cooking department, (as my friends and family will gladly tell you!) I met with Sister Jo-Ann to see what else was needed. She suggested I put my skills as a Massage Therapist to use, and offer mini-treatments to the residents.

I have many cherished memories: former resident Bob sharing his musical choice for the day, Noreen with her many visitors chattering at the dining room table, and the wonderful community at the "family dinners" for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Jocelyn House really does feel like a home, and although the family members change from time to time, the feeling of closeness and support remains. It's often a lively place, with knitters in the living room, bakers in the kitchen, and someone always around to put on a fresh pot of coffee.

When I see the relief in the faces of family members and friends who come to visit, it almost brings tears to my eyes. They experience the warmth of JH, and have the peace of knowing that their loved one is safe and in good hands-much as I did on that warm August day in 2013.

Thank goodness for the staff and volunteers at Jocelyn House - there really is no place like it.
